## 60-second shorts to scare your pants off

F you've been watching AMC's MonsterFest this week, you may have seen these crazy, one-minute scary shorts (that doesn't mean a fat guy in his tidy whities).

Tonight (appropriately at midnight), horror honcho John Carpenter hosts a half-hour show of 15 of the best, oddest and scariest of these 50 really odd screamers.

Carpenter, who is most famous for "Halloween" — a really, really scary movie that set off a chain reaction of "Halloweens" with yet another one due this year — says they're looking for the next "him."

Horror, he explains, changes with the times. But the formula for a good, scary movie remains the same: "no money, and nobig name actors."

So with that in mind, he and AMC went searching where no mogul has gone before — to amateurs who don't even know how to take meetings.

The result are these 60-second screamers.

They range from silly to scary to odd to I-really-

What's amazing is that these shorts are for the most part incredibly well done. In fact, there's only one with a Plastic Man from Outer Space, but it's supposed to be funny.

My personal favorite is called "Hunger" by Jay Holben. To tell a story in less than a minute is tough enough, but making it scary to boot is a real accomplishment. And Holben manages to do both.

Other notables in the fun
fest include "Spooky," by
Shipherd Reed, about a
woman who wakes up in a
forest and is beckoned by a
little girl; "Alarm" by Maureen Timpa Hendricks,
about a woman who finds a
door in her bed and everytime she opens it she ends
up waking up in someone
else's bed; and "Urban
Legend" by Aaron Hendricks, about a dog who's
having trouble breathing.

Good for AMC for trying something completely different — and for Carpenter for looking for new talent. Even though he's still very much in the game.
